

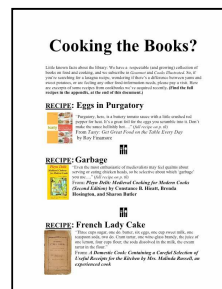
# Library Bulletin

We've added hundreds of books to our collection since the beginning of 2008, and they're all listed here. Please come to the library and check them out—then check one out to read during the coming break.

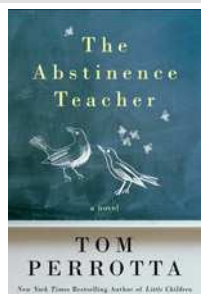
